- From the date of service
- From the denial date
- From the receipt of denial
- From the appeal
- From the appeal denial
- From the Notice of Dispute
- From somewhere else

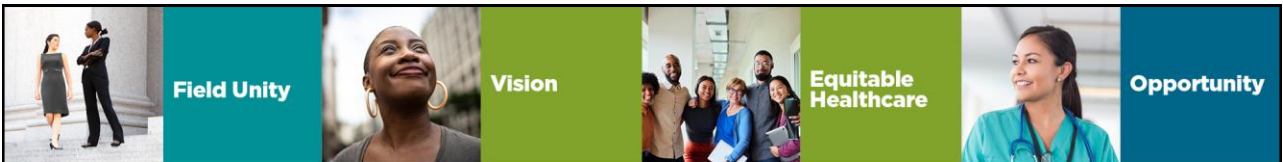
