- Financially constrained;
- Often located in physician and mental Health Professional Shortage Areas; and
- Often the sole providers of health-related services in their communities.

Despite these challenges, Illinois' small and rural hospitals continue to transform the delivery of healthcare and provide the highest quality care to the communities they serve.










Economic Engines and Jobs that Bolster Working Families


Inpatient Decline Compared to Outpatient Growth

Illinois' small and rural hospitals provide a greater proportion of care on an outpatient basis than other hospitals. In 2020, they had 19.9 inpatient admissions per 1,000 outpatient visits compared to 43.8 inpatient admissions per 1,000 outpatient visits in other hospitals.

- ▶ 85.5% of all surgeries in small and rural hospitals were performed on an outpatient basis in 2020.
- > 71.9% of their net revenue was from outpatient services compared to 47.4% for all other hospitals.

As more services are provided in the outpatient setting, many rural funding programs have become outdated and fail to provide the intended financial stability.

Important Providers of Community Healthcare Services




In addition, the percentage of small and rural hospitals providing community-based services has grown over the last decade (2010–2020). The percent providing:

- Alcohol/Drug Abuse services grew by 100%
- **Dental services** grew by 66.7%
- Fitness Centers grew by 18.8%

- **Freestanding outpatient centers** grew by 14.3%
- Crisis Prevention services grew by 7.1%


Inpatient Days in Long-term Care Setting

Many small and rural hospitals provide long-term care. In hospitals providing this service, **52.7%** of inpatient days take place in the long-term care setting. This compares to **22.8%** of inpatient days for all other hospitals.

Providing Health Screenings and Healthy Food

At-risk communities often have limited access to both healthcare and nutritional food. **FHN Memorial Hospital** in Freeport addresses both issues with its Mobile Rx Program. Through a partnership with the Northern Illinois Food Bank the program provides residents with medical screenings and healthy food at the same time. FHN also offers wraparound services, connecting program participants with social service agencies when needed. This dual approach reduces food insecurity, as well as emergency department visits for vulnerable populations.

Improving Emergency Preparedness

HSHS St. Joseph's Hospital, Breese brought together hospital leaders and frontline healthcare professionals to enhance workplace safety through a strategic collaboration with county officials and other hospitals. The hospital team standardized and improved drills, education and supplies. These efforts resulted in optimized emergency response and enhanced coordination with emergency medical services—better protecting both patients and staff in the event of a crisis.

Reducing Opioid Prescribing

A multidisciplinary team at Genesis Medical Center. Aledo employs several interventions to reduce opioid prescribing and save lives. Staff from the hospital and its family practice clinic established a pain management clinic; launched an alternative prescribing improvement program; and implemented patient opioid contracts and drug testing. Emergency department staff also limited opioid dispensing. As a result, opioid prescribing has dropped by 49%—preventing \$1.1 million in healthcare and justice costs, plus lost productivity.

Addressing Childhood Obesity

Lincoln Memorial Hospital partnered with Lincoln Elementary School District 27 to reduce childhood obesity and promote healthy habits from a young age. Hospital staff worked with educators to enhance the Coordinated Approach to Child Health program, which incorporates health lessons into the curriculum and increases movement during the school day. Lincoln Memorial also helped the school add more fresh and local foods into kids' meals, improving overall well-being.



Improving COPD Patient Education


Patients with chronic obstructive pulmonary disease (COPD) find support at Fairfield Memorial **Hospital's** Better Breathers Club. The hospital in southern Illinois uses a multidisciplinary approach for COPD management. training staff as certified pulmonary disease educators and providing educational materials at patients' bedsides. Through community education, Fairfield Memorial prevents hospital stays and reduces healthcare costs for COPD patients.

Preventing Hypoglycemia in Inpatients Receiving Insulin

Washington County Hospital in Nashville took action on hypoglycemia, which is common among inpatients receiving insulin. The hospital's multidisciplinary team re-educated clinical staff on the different types of insulin, proper use of point-of-care monitors and two-person verification. Leaders also worked with the hospital's electronic medical record (EMR) vendor to enhance insulin order sets. These evidence-based interventions have reduced adverse drug events (ADEs) and decreased length of stay.

Getting Hospital-Level Care at Home

Patients as far as 60 miles from **Blessing Health System** in Quincy can get hospital-level care in their home as part of a three-year study called the Rural Home Hospital Project. Home care includes twice-a-day nurse visits and a daily telehealth check-up with a physician. Patients also wear a patch monitoring vital signs, which their physician can check via computer or phone. The study seeks to build, launch and evaluate a nationwide home healthcare program serving rural residents.

Reducing Behavioral Health Readmissions


To meet the complex needs of behavioral health patients, **OSF HealthCare Saint Elizabeth Medical Center** in Ottawa enhanced protocols across departments. Patients receive psychiatric evaluations and therapy appointments within seven days of inpatient discharge. The hospital also provides telehealth, case management appointments, medication assistance and safety plans at the time of discharge. Together, these actions have decreased readmissions, which reduces delays in the emergency department (ED) and improves overall patient outcomes.

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Spotlight on OB Services

Solutions to Address Reductions in Services

Faced with low reimbursement from Medicaid and low patient volume, some rural hospitals have been forced to close obstetric units in order to remain viable. As a result, patients have to travel longer distances for some prenatal services and delivery. Hospitals have come up with creative solutions to provide this care.



Rural OB Solutions

Gibson Area Hospital and Health Services, Gibson City

This Critical Access Hospital has been providing OB services to eight counties in east central Illinois since it opened in 1952. At eight clinics, family practice physicians with OB training see patients. Six of these providers share call duties and OB coverage, with recruitment efforts aimed at expanding the team.

Patients as far away as 50 miles come to Gibson Area Hospital and Health Services (GAHHS) to deliver. Every year, the hospital brings between 225 and 250 babies into the world, or about half the deliveries in its market.

In 2024, GAHHS invested over \$3 million into a new, stateof-the-art OB unit with five labor and delivery rooms, a dedicated C-Section suite, and nursery unit. The hospital has partnered with UI Health to open a rural track family practice OB residency. Secondand third-year residents will work at GAHHS for their entire residency, learning rural medicine. The first resident joined the hospital on Jan. 1, 2022.

Jersey Community Hospital, Jerseyville


While this tweener hospital no longer delivers babies, it still provides OB services for its patients. An employed OB/ GYN sees patients in Jerseyville, but delivers at Alton Memorial Hospital in Alton—about 20 miles away. This physician also is part of the Alton Memorial Hospital call group. This creative arrangement has made it possible for families to receive OB services and deliver without driving long distances. Jersey Community Hospital is located in western Illinois outside of St. Louis.

Crawford Memorial Hospital, Robinson

The OB physician at this Critical Access Hospital in eastern Illinois identifies patients with complicated or high-risk pregnancies who need maternal-fetal medicine services. Every first Wednesday of the month those patients can meet with a maternalfetal medicine specialist via telemedicine instead of having to travel. In the first three months of 2022, Crawford Memorial Hospital provided these services to seven women.
