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Midwest Alliance for Patient Safety PSO Presents Patient Safety Champion Award to a Rush Copley Medical Center Employee

Naperville, III.—On October 30, 2019, the Midwest Alliance for Patient Safety (MAPS) Patient Safety Organization (PSO) awarded Suzanne Khoury, a senior medical technologist at Rush Copley Medical Center in Aurora, with the MAPS PSO Patient Safety Champion award for preventing patient harm. MAPS PSO is an Illinois Health and Hospital Association (IHA) company.

The MAPS PSO committee selected Khoury because of her due diligence in identifying and correcting a mechanical malfunction that produced incorrect lab results. She was specifically honored for detecting a problem with one of the facility's chemistry analyzers and recognizing the potential for inaccurate urea nitrogen results. With patient safety top of mind, Khoury disabled the auto-verification function so the inaccurate results would not be included in patients' electronic health records.

Khoury took it upon herself to perform additional tests—and her troubleshooting led to the discovery of a mechanical issue. To ensure patients were retested, Khoury informed every nursing unit and physician at the facility of the faulty analyzer. She also notified the device manufacturer and worked with the company on organizing a quality control lecture series to ensure the errors did not continue.

"Suzanne Khoury went above and beyond in putting patients first," said Barry C. Finn, CEO of Rush Copley Medical Center. "Her work ethic and exceptional character are reflected in her pursuit of a solution. We are proud of her unwavering commitment to our safety culture."

"Relying on artificial intelligence and computer results are no match for the human factor," added Linda England, MS, Rush Copley's laboratory director. "This extra diligence in reviewing trends and conducting additional tests prevented physicians from receiving incorrect values. Suzanne is considered an expert in her area." Khoury's keen eye, due diligence and initiative ensured patient safety by preventing diagnostic errors—which could lead to inappropriate or delayed treatment.
